Lesson

- 1. Warm up for reading Students read familiar books.
- Introduction of President and Cabinet Introduce President and Cabinet by looking at the cover photo and starting a discussion about the Cabinet.

Suggested questions to facilitate introductory conversation:

- What do you think the Cabinet is?
- Look at the cover. What duties does the Cabinet have?
- Which department would you want to work in? Why?
- Skimming and Scanning President and Cabinet Use this time to introduce or review your lesson focus strategies and/or skills.

Suggested skimming and scanning prompts:

- What page(s) would you look at to read about elections?
 Which text feature(s) helped you find that information?
- What is the purpose of a heading? How are they helpful to you as the reader?
- Reading President and Cabinet Students read independently.

 After reading President and Cabinet — Open the conversation with a question that relates to the comprehension strategy of asking questions. After a brief conversation about the contents of the book move to questions that support your lesson focus.

Suggested after reading content connection questions:

- Why does the president meet with leaders of other countries?
- What are the benefits of allowing the president to pick his own Cabinet members?
- Looking at the chart on pages 18 and 19, which Cabinet member has the most important job? Why?

Suggested after reading lesson focus prompts:

- I noticed (student's name) using (reading strategy) while you
 were reading. Did it help with your reading? (Repeat this
 question to highlight different reading strategies or skills used
 by students.)
- Did you notice the captions throughout the book? What is the main purpose of a caption? How does it help you as the reader?
